



## Bishop Chris McLeod installed as Dean of St Peter’s

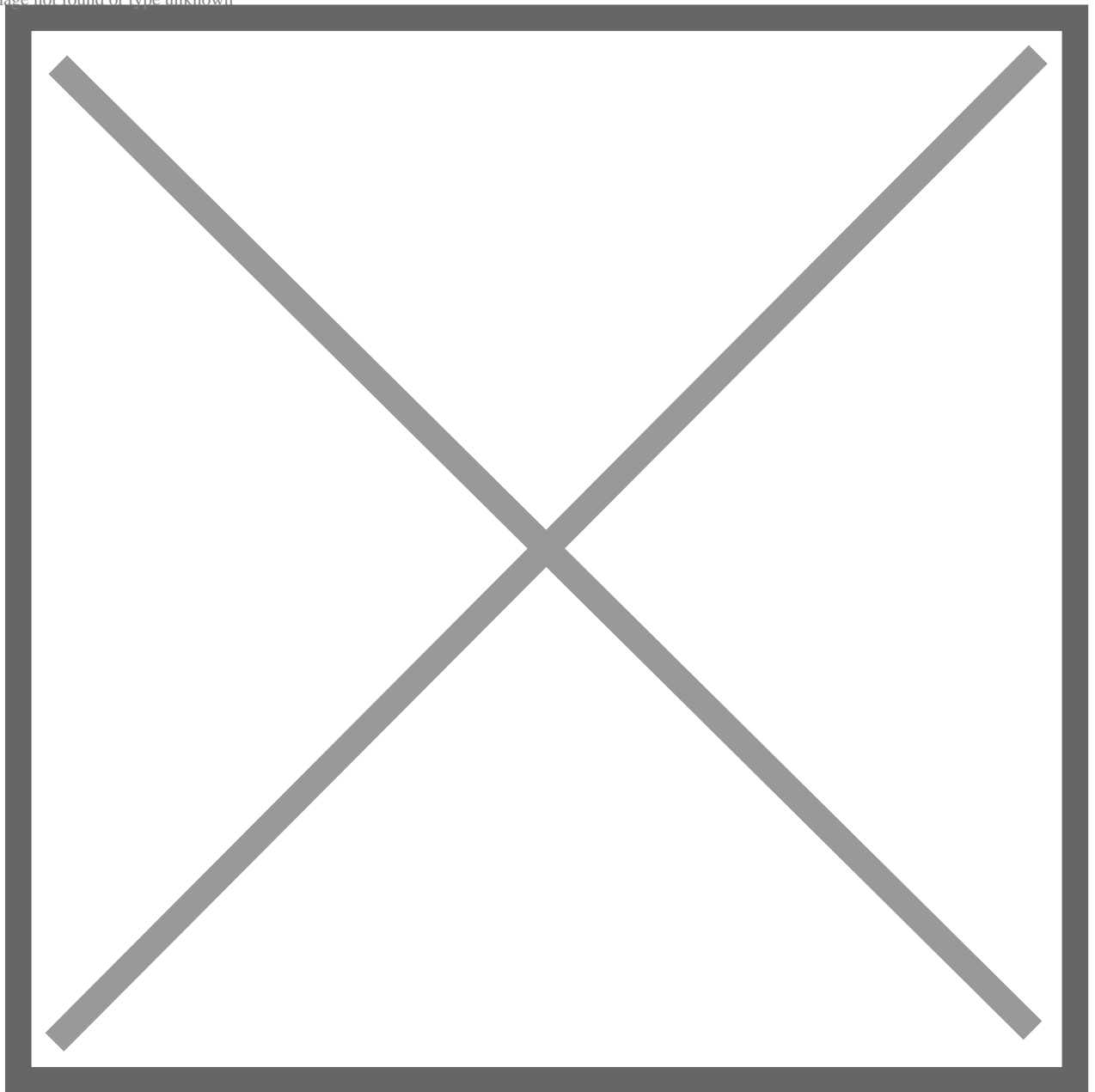
Bishop Chris McLeod was installed as Dean of St Peter’s Cathedral in Adelaide at a Solemn Evensong on Sunday evening.

It is the latest milestone for Bishop Chris, a Gurindji man whose mother was a member of the Stolen Generations.

“I think my Mum would’ve been proud,” he told the congregation.

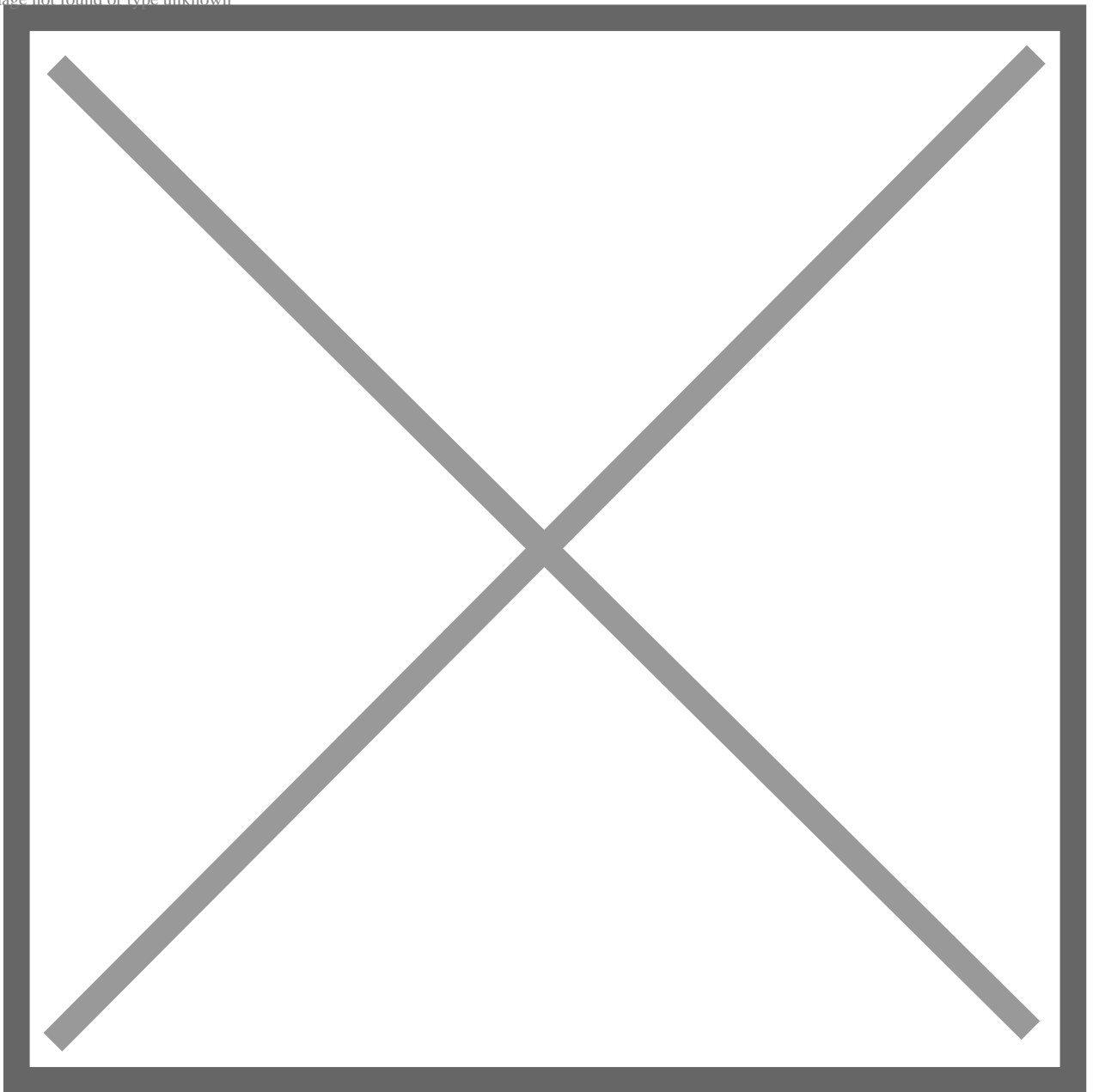
### Mr Karl Winda Telfer's Welcome to Country

The service was attended by the Governor of South Australia, Frances Adamson AC, who read the First Lesson, the Premier, Steven Marshall, and Adelaide Lord Mayor Sandy Verschoor.

Marshall and Verschoor joined the Rev'd Anne Hewitt, executive director of Churches Together SA, the Ven David Bassett and Reuben Jacob, St Peter's People's Warden in speeches of welcome for Bishop Chris.

The new Dean says he looks forward to working with the Cathedral in strengthening our service to the community, especially with the First Nations' people of Adelaide.

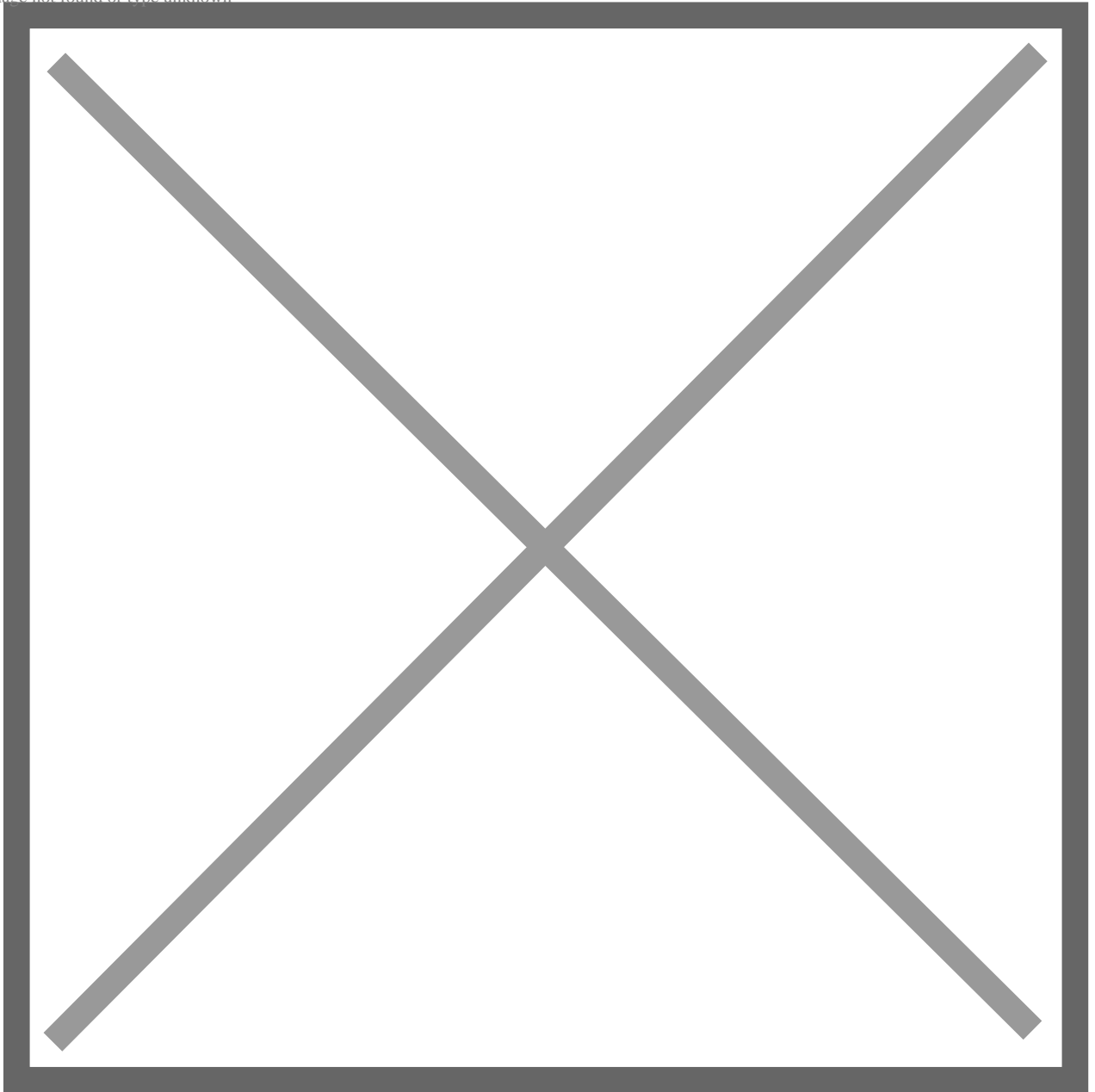


Parishioners of the Cathedral present symbols of ministry To Bishop Chris.
