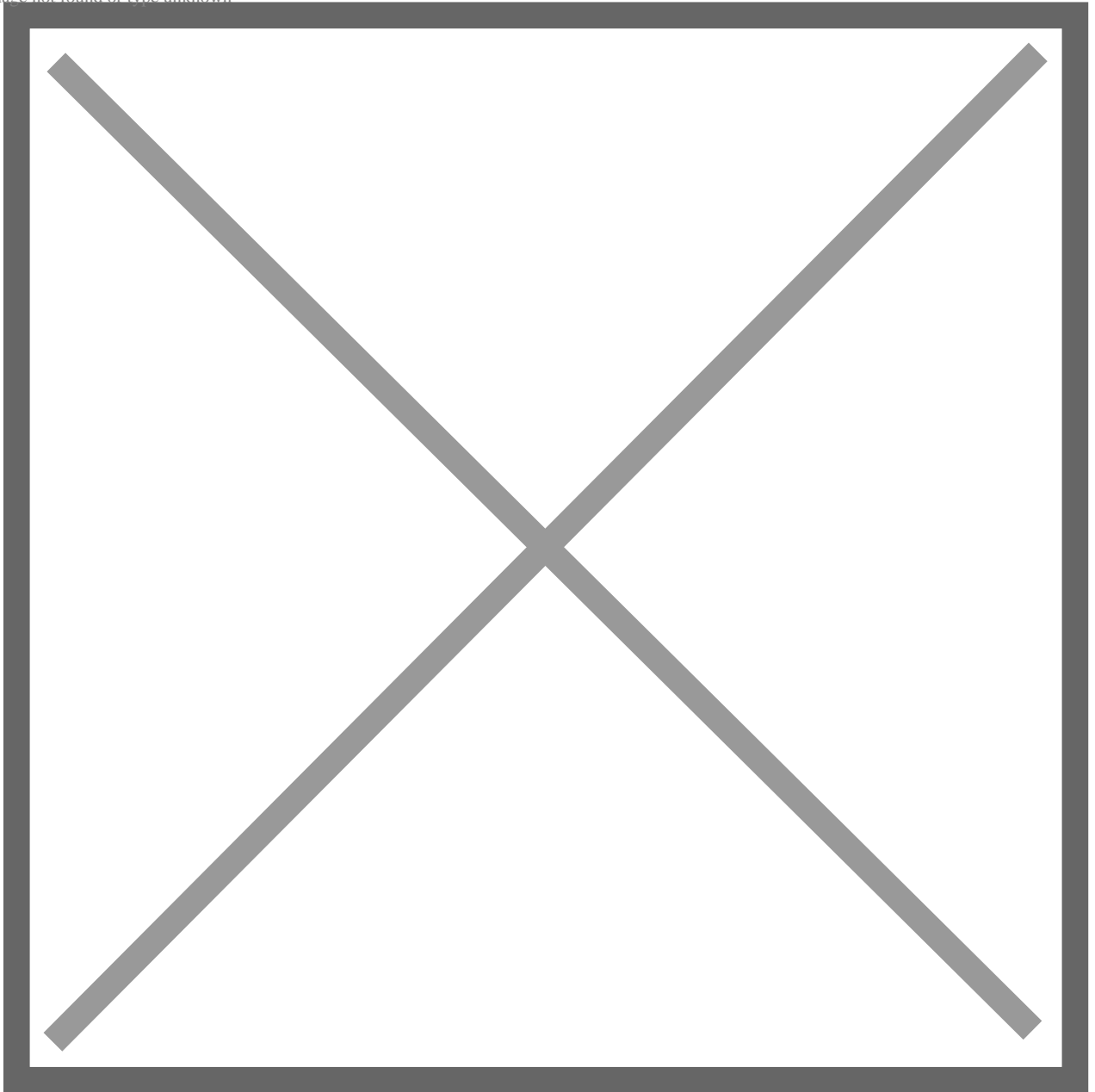




Hundreds visit All Souls art exhibition

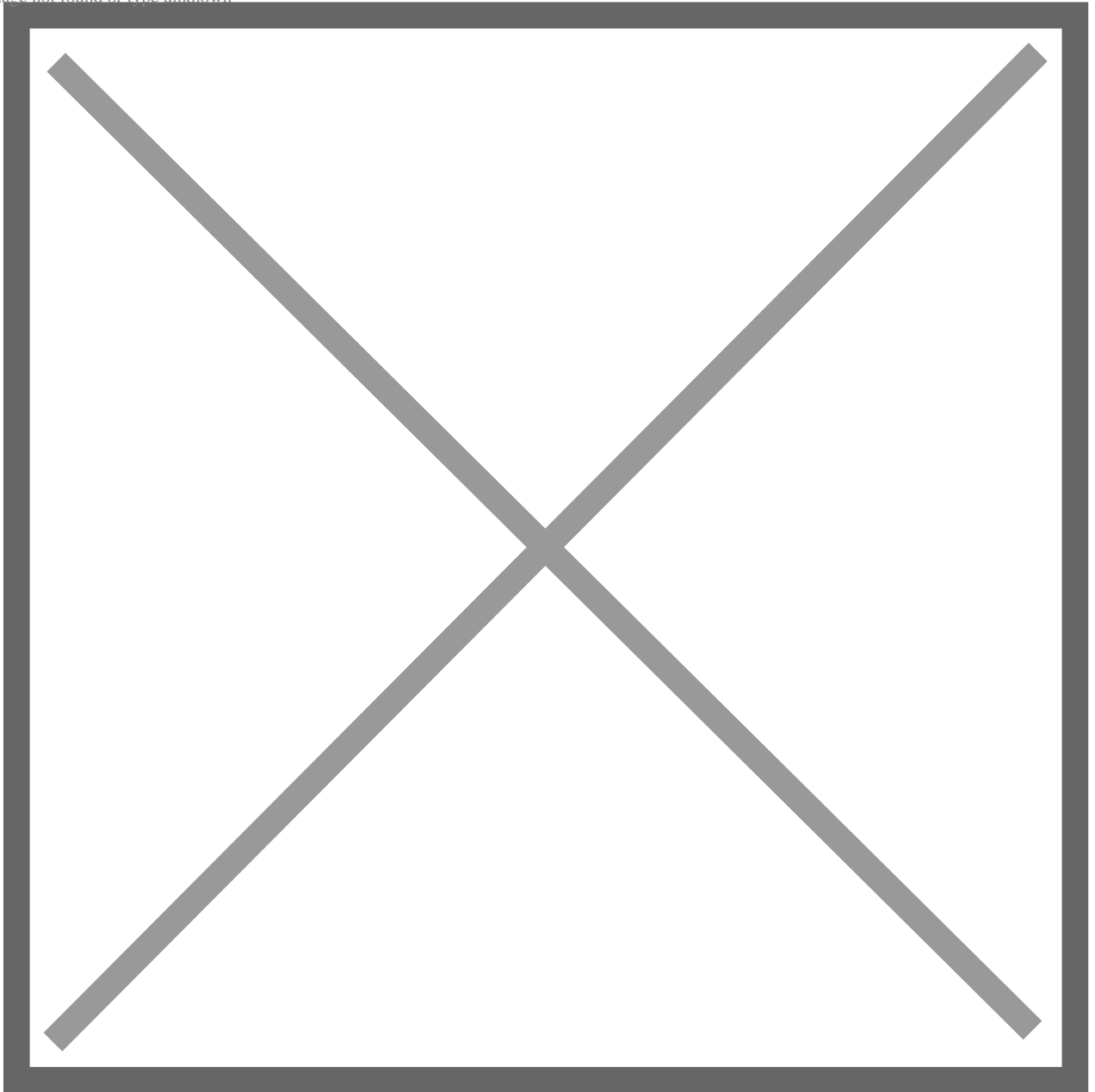


Glass artist Eamonn Vereker's work displayed below the William Morris Peace window.

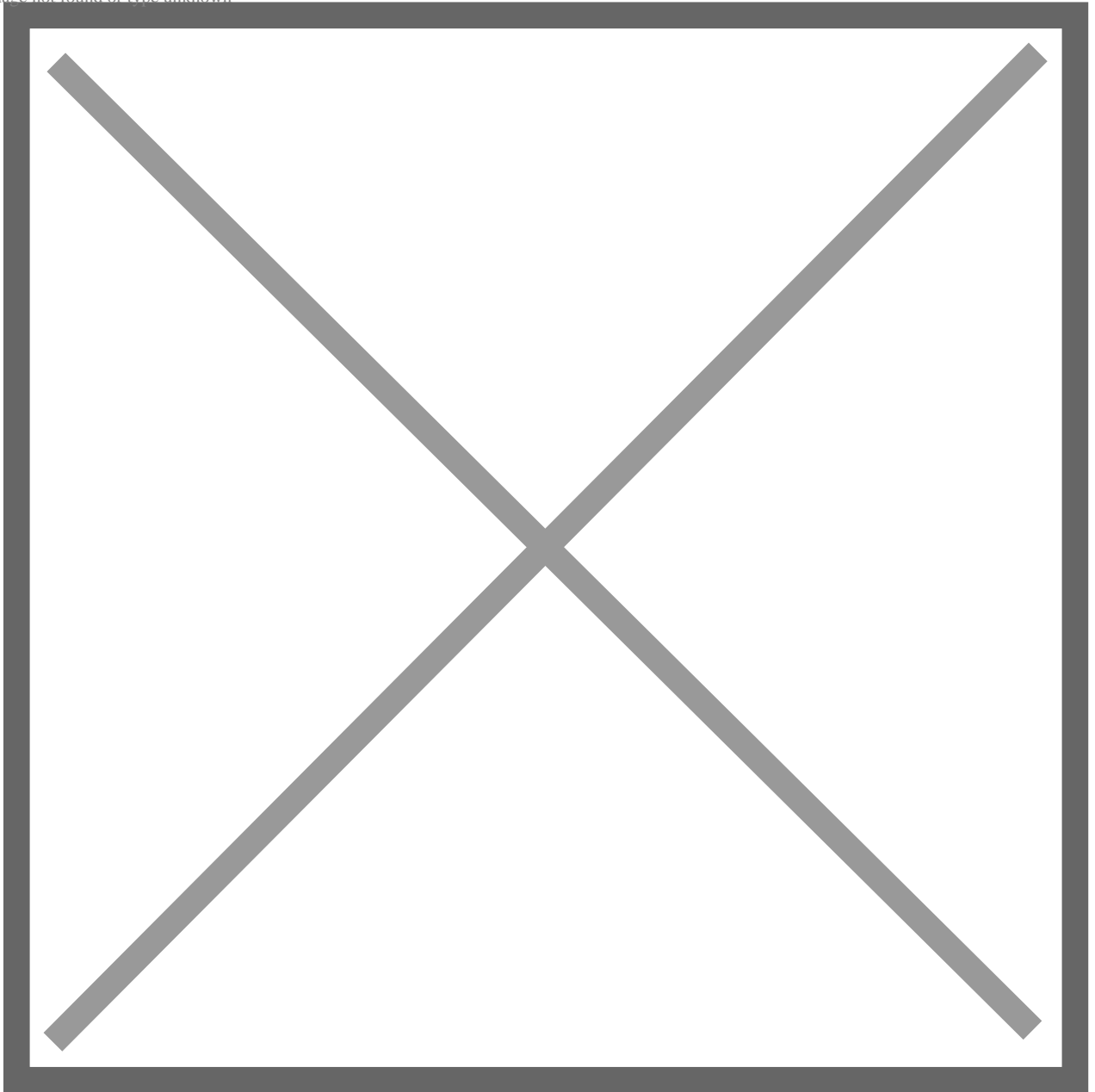
